dispense for his trouble. I began to enter the great hall and quickly remembered to reach into my pouch and drape the gold chain with the attached


sentries preceding the others into the Great Hall. It was here that the wealth of the kingdom is housed. The castle gate had already been opened


earlier on the orders of Lord Walter and Lady Kim. I wish I had gotten even a fleeting glance.

MARK THE CALENDAR WE ARE GETTING CLOSE



In God We Trust medal is the latest PAN project that is continuing with great enthusiasm. PAN president Tom Uram developed the idea as a result of the National Motto 150th Anniversary. They are for sale on the PAN website www.pancoins.org with payment by credit card. Part of the proceeds of the medal sale is donated to PAN.

The key players in having the motto placed on our coinage were U.S. Mint Director and later 13th Governor of PA, James Pollock, Salmon P. Chase Treasury Secretary under Abraham Lincoln and Reverend Mark R. Watkinson.

Each medal is housed in a folder that explains the idea of a National Motto and each man's role in the process of an Act of Congress to have In God We Trust placed on the two-cent piece of 1864.

The likeness of these famous men is beautifully done by the skill of U.S. Mint sculptor and engraver Don Everhart. These medals make a great gift along with an historic story.

PAN LAPEL PIN PAN president, Tom Uram, had beautiful lapel pins made as a thank you gifts to be sent to anyone that donates \$100 or more to PAN. The design is based on our 3" logo medal. The difference is that the white metal gives an appearance of silver rather that of our 3" bronze logo medal. It is set off very nicely with the black enamel.

PAN DEALER CORNER

WHY DO TABLE HELPERS OR SPOUSES HAVE TO BE PAN MEMBERS? This was a question that was asked by one of our dealers. We understand that this issue seems petty and that the \$5 associates' dues can be considered just another annoyance and a tactic to make more money.

The answer is through the course of hosting PAN coin shows since the late 1970's; all sorts of problems or situations have come up over the years. Occasionally a dispute between a buyer and seller occurs. Sometimes it can escalate to the point of requiring security to remove a person from the show floor. That person could be a PAN member who objects on the basis of his membership. We have heard the argument that a said dealer or helper is not even a PAN member and should be removed instead. It is our policy to have every dealer and helper as part of our membership. You then as a dealer are now invested and partnered with what PAN does. You are part of the organization that is providing the venue and as such, are in an equal position when we have to mediate a dispute. Granted it is a rare occasion but it has happened. Thanks for your understanding.

PAN FALL SHOW TABLE WINNER At each PAN Show we have a dealer drawing. It is called the PAN TABLE GAMES. Decks of playing cards are made up with each table holder's name. They are placed in a container until Saturday at noon. The cards are then removed, cut, and shuffled. The previous winner is asked to draw a single card from the deck and that cardholder is given a free, no strings attached, table at the next PAN show. This past May show's previous winner, Al Stricker "The Nickel Trader" drew Terry Bogert "Letchworth Coins". Congrats to Terry and we look forward to the next winner in October.


