How Do The PAN Shows Compare?

One of the statistics that we like to do is to attempt to track the number of dealers and attendees at coin shows and create a ratio. These are difficult numbers to acquire since not all shows publish both numbers. We have been able to assemble some numbers for the last three years of a few coin shows.

The attendance numbers presented do not include dealers or table help. Some shows combine both so we subtracted the number of dealers listed in their directories. Our goal was

to see how the PAN shows stacked up as compared to others. We decided to published this list only now and have stats going back to 2013. If you run a coin show and have accurate numbers then we would be grateful to include them.

We view this as a tool to determine the trends and the health of the coin show business. Major national shows tend to attract attendees that are serious buyers and sellers. Smaller shows may have a mix of serious buyers to curiosity seekers. There are many other factors that determine the success of a coin show. This is only presented as food for thought. The chart at left offers some considerations that dealers weigh out when selecting which shows to attend. An established customer base is likely their primary consideration. This takes time to develop. A tip about the PAN shows and the demographic of the area - *if your material is reasonably priced and you are friendly then you should do well at a PAN show*. Pittsburgh folks like to walk around and kick the tires a little bit before they buy. They often come back.

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The Gold Medal of Theodoric the Great, King of the Ostrogoths (AD 493-526) by E. Tomlinson Fort

The fifth century saw the collapse of the western Roman Empire and the rise of a number of so called successor states under various Germanic speaking tribes including the Vandals (North Africa), the Franks (Gaul), the Suevi (the area of much of modern Portugal), the Visigoths (the rest of the Iberian peninsula and south western Gaul) and the Anglo-Saxons (Britain south of the Firths). One of the most interesting of these new Germanic kingdoms was that of the Ostrogoths which occupied all of the Italian peninsula and parts of the western Balkans as well.

The first and greatest of the Ostrogothic kings was Theodoric. He ruled first the Amal Goths and later a coalition of other Gothic tribes and various other groups which came to be called the Ostrogoths (for Eastern Goths). He also would seize power in Italy and by 511 control, or have dominant influence over, two thirds of the old Western Roman Empire.

Born in 454 in what is now western Austria, Theodoric was the son the Amal king Theodemir and a 'concubine' Ereleuva. In view of the fact that many early Germanic rulers practiced various types of polygamy she may have been considered a wife among the Amals. In compliance with a treaty between them and the Eastern emperor Leo I (457-474), Theodoric was sent to Constantinople as a hostage at the age of ten in 464. For the next ten years he lived in and around the eastern capital. There he would have received a traditional Roman education including the ability to speak, read and write in Greek and Latin. In 581 King Theodemir died and Theodoric eventually succeeded to the throne through a mixture of political abilities, military skill and total ruthlessness that eliminated all rivals. He also gained some imperial favour since he was made a Master of the Soldiers (*magister militum*) in 483 and he achieved the consulship in 484. However, these eastern honours seem to have done little to create any loyalty towards the eastern empire. Using the same methods that had lead him to the throne, over the next few years Theodoric built a coalition with other tribes and created a significant military force north of the Balkans that became known as the Ostrogoths. He then used this force as a means to extract payment from Constantinople to prevent him raiding into their territories.

At the time, the Ostrogoths were settled in Byzantine territory as <u>foederati</u> ('allies') of the Romans, but were becoming restless and increasingly difficult for Emperor Zeno to manage. Not long after Theodoric became king, the two men worked out an arrangement beneficial to both sides. The Ostrogoths needed a place to live, and Zeno needed help dealing with the troublesome Odovacar, the king of Italy, who had come to power in 476. Ostensibly a viceroy for Zeno, Odovacar was menacing Byzantine territory and not respecting the rights of Roman citizens in the Italian peninsula. Seeing an opportunity in pitting two Germanic speaking rulers against one another, Zeno

encouraged Theodoric to look for better opportunities towards the west. This also benefitted Theodoric since occupying the north Balkans and the Hungarian plain made the Ostrogoths an obvious target for both Zeno and Odovacar should their military interests shift. Therefore, the Ostrogoths invaded Odovacar's kingdom in 488.

Once Theodoric entered the Italian peninsula, he won a series of battles between 488 and 492-493 and took the former western imperial capital of Ravenna. On 2 February of 493, Theodoric and Odovacar signed a treaty that assured both parties would rule as equals over Italy. Later a banquet was organised in order to celebrate the agreement. It was at this celebration that Theodoric personally killed Odovacar by nearly cutting him in two with a sword. Thus, he secured all of Italy, the parts northern Balkans and regions on the Hungarian plain for himself.

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PAN volunteer Matt Campbell presented his exhibit on the Carnegie Hero Medal as part of the Washington Symphony Orchestra's February 18 concert, "Music to the Rescue," in Washington, PA.

The orchestra presented a program of music on the theme of heroes. Before the concert, the orchestra honored local heroes in the Washington County recipients, some of whom were in attendance, of the Carnegie Hero Medal. The Carnegie Hero Fund was established in 1904 by Andrew Carnegie to recognize civilian acts of heroism. The fund has awarded over 10,000 medals throughout the United States and Canada since 1904.

Campbell presented his exhibit in the lobby before, during, and after the concerts to interested patrons and spoke about the medals and how they are awarded. PAN President Tom Uram was in attendance as well to help answer questions and promote PAN as well as





Washington's local coin club. Campbell's exhibit includes a silver medal awarded to 1908 to the mother of Ivah Coles, who drowned attempting to save a friend; a bronze medal awarded in 1931 in its original packaging; and a 100th anniversary commemorative silver medal issued by the Carnegie Hero Fund in 2004.

The exhibit has been displayed at the PAN show multiple times and at the Central States convention in April 2017; the ANA show in Denver in summer 2017; and the FUN show in January of this year.
