CAG will showcase over a dozen of the most significant artifacts from this collection, including several that were on the Apollo 11 mission to the moon, in which Armstrong famously made the "giant leap for mankind." See these artifacts on display at NGC Booth #1417 through the afternoon of Friday, August 17.

Heritage Auctions will be offering a one of a kind George Washington gold piece that is part of Eric Newman's collection. The story is that president Washington carried this as a pocket piece. It will be auctioned on August 16th Platinum Night.




PAN has a numismatic MacMoment on August 3rd. To celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Big Mac, McDonald's unveiled the MacCoin, a limited edition global currency. The promotion Began at lunch time on August 2nd. Customers were able to receive a MacCoin with the purchase of a Big Mac at 14,000 participating restaurants across the U.S., while supplies lasted. Starting on August 3rd through 2018, customers can redeem their MacCoin for a free Big Mac at participating McDonald's restaurants in the U.S. and in more than 50 participating countries.

More than 6.2 million MacCoins were distributed globally in more than 50 countries while supplies lasted. These good for tokens feature five unique designs, each representing a


decade of the Big Mac. Each MacCoin design pulls in elements from that time in history, nodding to art, music and pop culture, while the front-side of the MacCoin celebrates the 50th anniversary of the Big Mac. The '70s showcased the decade's flower power. The '80s alluded to pop art. The '90s defined with bold, abstract

shapes. The early '00s specifically focused on the technology that was at the forefront of the turn of the century. The evolution of communication is the theme of the '10s decade.

A Silver Half-penny of John Baliol

A silver half-penny of John Baliol, King of Scots (1292-1296) struck at St. Andrews. The obverse reads IOHANNES DEI GRA while the reverse has the inscription CiVITA S ANDRE.



The origins of the town of St. Andrews are lost to history. In the eighth century Oengus I son of Fergus, king of the Picts (732-761), founded a monastery there to house some bones of St. Andrew that were brought to the town by St. Regulus. From this period onwards the town become one of the most important centres of Christianity in Scotland and an important place of pilgrimage that brought people from all over Europe.

In the reign of King David I (1124-1153) a mint was established in the town. Only one moneyer, Mainard, is known to have struck coins. Sadly the sources from the reign give no information as to whether or not the profits of this small mint (only about five examples are known today) went of the king or Bishop Robert of Scone (1124-1159).

No coins bearing a St. Andrews mint signature are known for the reigns of Malcolm IV (1153-1165), William I (1165-1214) or Alexander II (1214-1249). It is likely that mint activity ceased in the burgh during David I's lifetime or shortly afterwards.

Early in the reign of Alexander III (1249-1286) coins bearing a St. Andrews mint signature struck by the moneyer Thomas were struck. All of this issue appeared early in the reform of the coinage that began in 1250. However, like many of the small mints that appear during this phase of Alexander's 'long cross' coinage the mint seems to have ceased to function well before the king's next reform in 1280.

Two documentary sources, the Scotichronicon by Walter Bower and the Orygynale Cronykil of Scotland by Andrew of Winton written in the early 15th century, record King Alexander III granting minting rights at St. Andrews to Bishop William Fraser in 1283. Sadly, the grant has not survived. Equally, the coins struck by Alexander III during this period do not have a mint signature. It has been presumed that all of the coins during this period were struck at Berwick since the town was Scotland's largest and was the kingdoms chief centre of trade. If St. Andrews was active in the period between 1283 and 1292 there is no numismatic evidence to support it.

It is during the reign of John Baliol (1292-1296) that St. Andrews once again appears as a mint. This time both pennies and half pennies were produced there. All coins from this mint are rare, but the later coinage is especially so. Dating King John's coinage is fairly straight forward. During the inter-regnum that occurred after Alexander III's death in 1286 coinage seems to have continued to be produced in his name. Such a practice was not uncommon in mediaeval Europe. In the case of Scotland this is demonstrated by the mules of King John obverses and Alexander III reverses.

John Baliol received the title of king at Berwick on 17 November 1292 and was crowned at Scone on 30 November 1292. Presumably his coinage began sometime after these dates. Though how long it took to prepare the new dies is unknown. The coinage must have ended when Edward I captured and sacked Berwick on 30 March 1296.

Contemporary accounts of Berwick's fall put the number of civilian dead between 4,000 and 17,000. This must mean that any minting activity ceased by this date at the latest. The fate(s) on the mint workers and town officials are not recorded but they cannot have been pleasant. The town never again reach the economic standing that it had held in the 12th and 13th centuries. Therefore coinage in the name of King John was struck over a period of about three years and two months at most. The Scottish defeat at the Battle of Dunbar on 27 April 1296 effectively ended serious Scottish resistance. King John abdicated on 10 July 1296.

St. Andrews seems to have been bypassed by the English invasion forces. This is not surprising. While the town was an important ecclesiastical centre, it held no strategic importance. Bishop William Fraser (1279-1297) was a strong supporter of John Baliol and opposed Edward I's attempt to intervene in Scottish affairs. However, he was not present to either join King John or to rally the kingdom against the English at the time of continued next page

Regarding the history of the mint during this period Holmes and Stewartby argue that the mint seems to

have begun coining in John Baliol's name after the principal mint at Berwick. Though it is impossible to know how much time passed, it is not likely to have been more than a month or two at most. The numismatic evidence suggests that that Berwick was the source of the dies used at St. Andrews. The punches used to make the letters are the same and the busts were crafted in the same style. Thus, the coinage from the town follows the lead of the much larger, and more important, mint to the south.

Baliol's coinage has been generally divided into two main issues: 'rough' and 'smooth'. The later issue was produced by dies with a more finely engraved portrait and a bolder letter font (especially the use of a chevron bar in the A. The earlier group is generally of much more coarser work than the later and many display a rough style of execution. This breakdown applies to coins produced at both Berwick and St. Andrews. Among the silver pence the early issues are more common than the later ones. However, among the half pennies the reverse is the case.

The St. Andrews half penny illustrated here is from the later 'smooth' issue.

Baliol's St. Andrews issues are unique among the whole Scottish coinage in that they use the word 'civitas' on the reverse. While the term is very common on the coinage of Edward I and a number of his successors in England and Ireland, It never appears again on a Scottish coin.


Initial plans are to have a silent auction and swap session following our meeting. Please plan on attending to meet with new IASAC members and reacquaint with old



Just in case you missed our past May Coin Show there is a video of U.S. Mint Senior Legal Counsel Greg Weinman's fascinating lecture about the 1933 Gold Double Eagles. The Newman Numismatic Portal provided the funding to have numismatic videographer David Lisot at the PAN show to record this rare lecture. The link above takes you to the NNP site where it is free to view by everyone. Greg was able to finally reveal more information since all the litigation involved with these coins has been exhausted. Some new revelations came to light concerning another 1933 gold piece. Greg stated that he was also 100% sure where another 1933 double eagle was located. That statement caught the attention of Paul Gilkes editor of Coin World who attended Greg's lecture at the PAN Spring show banquet Thursday evening. Paul contacted Greg the following week to inquire why he is so sure of the referenced coin's whereabouts. Greg informed him that is housed in Fort Knox, KY with the ten Langbord specimens and was turned in by an anonymous collector.

How did PAN swing this lecture? PAN President Tom Uram asked Greg if he would be willing to attend our show and present a lecture about the litigation involved in this fascinating case. Greg said he would look into the possibility. After various approvals and clearances the arrangements were made. The U.S. Mint police brought two of the Langbord specimens to our coin show and our



banquet for public display. Many lined up to have a look at these rarities. We extend sincere thanks to the many people involved to make this rare interesting incite of these legendary coins and their display possible!



John Mercanti Sculpture Part of ANA Silent Auction

The American Numismatic Association will conduct a silent auction in conjunction with the World's Fair of Money in Philadelphia next week. The 127th Anniversary ANA Awards Banquet & Silent Auction

begins at 7 p.m. with a cocktail hour and silent auction viewing at the Philadelphia Marriott Downtown on Friday evening August 17th.

Retired 12th Chief engraver John Mercanti's latest sculpture "His Rendition of Liberty" is a hand-signed original sculpt that will be one of the featured items of the silent auction with the proceeds benefiting the Robert Lecce Advanced Scholarship Program.

The popular ANA silent auctions have been a marvelous chance to bid and own some great numismatic items. How very fitting that the home city of the U.S. Mint is the setting for one of John's latest works. His eagle design on the American Silver Eagle silver coins are world-renowned. Many collectors worldwide have followed John's Perth Mint Wedged Tailed Eagle designs. Mr. Mercanti seems to be as busy in retirement as he was during his chief engraver days at he mint.

We are told that John's granddaughter modeled for this beautiful rendition of Lady Liberty. This is a good opportunity to own something personally special to John Mercanti and know that the monies went to a very worthy cause.





The 2018 ANA official convention medals are designed by Jamie Franki and sculpted by noted medallic artist Heidi Wastweet. This beautiful medal presents a beautiful rendition of Pennsylvania founder William Penn. The reverse is equally beautiful with a design loadedwith wonderful symbolism featuring the City of Brotherly Love, the melodic heart shaped leaves, the all seeing eye of God on humanity as used in our nation's great seal, along with a splash of Greek to keep us cultured. Jamie's ¾ facing Jefferson nickel is currently used on our nation's coinage. He has also done presentations at our past PAN coin shows.

Obverse: William Penn; English real estate entrepreneur, philosopher, early Quaker, and founder of the British

North American colony the Province of Pennsylvania.

Reverse: A Love Token for Philadelphia and Numismatics, featuring engraved elements from American paper currency that form a heart shape, which serves to frame the word Love.

Medals are available as a convention medal badge (1.5" bronze medal with a ribbon drape) \$20; Bronze Medal (2.75") \$65; or as a two-medal (1.5" bronze medal and 1.5" .999 FS medal, numbered) set for \$100. They can be purchased at the ANA area (booth #99) at the show.

The PAN Fall Lecture series is shaping up to be another good one. We may have one more speaker to add but will be able to confirm after the ANA World's Fair of Money show ends next week.
